### MINUTES FOR LEECHWELL GARDEN ASSOCIATION COMMITTEE MEETING 5<sup>th</sup> September 2022 in the REconomomy Centre

1. APOLOGIES: Lu Overy

**2. PREVIOUS MINUTES:** the minutes of the meeting on 5<sup>th</sup> July 2022 were approved.

3. MATTERS ARISING

None.

#### 4. PROJECTS

The main purpose of the meeting (and the reason for Keith and Holly's presence) was to discuss the Wildlife Garden project. Attached to these minutes are Sue's map of the garden areas and Keith's document listing details and possible costs.

Keith reminded the meeting that Park Life was a not-for-profit organization that did not 'bid' for projects but acted as a facilitator for community environmental projects - obtaining funds or grants and then arranging for the work to be done. Keith had already drafted a lottery grant proposal, with castings, that Sue had distributed to the committee so the bulk of the meeting was spent with Keith explain how Park Life would do the necessary work:

- 1. Proving more detail for an "Awards for All" lottery bid (max £10K)
- 2. Conducting a survey of garden users to provide the necessary proof of community support.

He thought that the project's emphasis on wildlife would not only improve our chances of obtaining a grant but would also make it easier to get volunteers to help with the work (a key part of ParkLife's approach). In answer to a question Keith said that the long-term maintenance of the wildlife area would be factored into the bid.

It was agreed that "Pool Garden" (called Magdelene Garden and marked 6 on Sue's Plan) should **not** be part of the project because of its likely cost and dependence on Heritage England

As far as timing was concerned, Keith felt the survey should be completed this month and the grant application submitted by early October (most of the actual work would be best done during the Winter months). Keith asked us to give him a definitive go-ahead and all present agreed.

There was some discussion of fund-raising – unfortunately most of the 'locality budget's of SHDC councilors has been exhausted. Dave volunteered to provide any 'front-loading' that might be required.

#### **5. AOB**

Finance: Paul had proposed the following budgetary items for approval:

- 1. Totnes festival events printing costs: £50 (to be recovered from additional donations)
- 2. Autumn planting budget: £100

The committee approved this. It was also agreed that a £3000 sinking fund should be maintained.


Meadow maintenance: Sue said that the LGA had paid Ross to do the necessary work but felt that Keith had previously agreed to do it. Keith said he didn't do it because that he felt his approach of doing the maintenance twice a year was not what the LGA wanted. It was agreed that since the meadow was a key part of the wildlife project we could discuss and agree details once the project was underway.

Keith said he thought that the pool area was now free of Japanese Knotweed thanks to Andrew's treatment!

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**6. NEXT MEETING:** the next meeting will be on Tuesday October 4<sup>th</sup> (the REconomy Centre room is already booked). There will probably be another meeting with Keith before that to discuss the details of the Lottery Bi and the noticeboards that are a key part of the wildlife project.
